The sports chair opens up all sorts of opportunities for Cameron and we just want to encourage him to explore them. It's all about him doing his own thing and boosting his confidence. Cameron is a typical 14-year-old who loves hanging around with his friends, playing on his X-box and following his favourite rugby league team, Castleford Tigers.

But Cameron, who has cerebral palsy, has had a tough few years. He had problems with splints on his legs, which meant a lot of hospital visits and pain from blisters that sometimes stopped him going to school. On top of this, Cameron and his family had to cope with the pandemic and lockdown measures.

Playing basketball has been one of Cameron's favourite things since he was six or seven. It's a great way for him to see his friends, get exercise and enjoy a buzz from competing. However, when he recently grew out of his sports wheelchair, funding wasn't available for a new one.

It was a difficult situation, but Variety was able to help out by paying for a new chair. Now Cameron's out and about on his wheels and back on the court again. He sees his friends, and like any teenager, he's enjoying being independent and finding his way in the world.

Cameron said: "I love basketball and I'd like to play in a league and then for England. I'd also like to play murderball, which is where you ram into other people."









Where we worked in 2021



Variety supported children in over 90 towns and cities across the UK - from Bolton to Portsmouth to Thirsk. We provided:

Equipment for children in towns and cities.

Sunshine Coaches in towns and cities.

Variety Great Days Out in towns and cities.



In 2021, we supplied 107 equipment grants



Our equipment grants included funding for sports, sensory and play equipment. We also funded hoists and orthopaedic furniture for children at home.

Variety pays for assistive devices for children irrespective of disability, illness or cost.

In 2021 Variety provided 107 **equipment grants** for:

• assistive devices enabling better care (such as bathing equipment, sleep systems and orthopaedic seating)

10 items of play and sports equipment

19 items of sensory equipment

6 assistive devices enabling mobility (including car seats and walking frames)

25 other items (including assistive technology and IT equipment)



Making Lilee-Anne's hydrotherapy easier





With Lilee-Anne's life limiting conditions, every day with her is a bonus. As she's a bit of a water baby, the hoist means we can easily transfer her every day into her hot tub (weather permitting), whereas before we had to wait for a few family members to assist us.

Nine-year-old Lilee-Anne from Wolverhampton received a grant from Variety to pay for vital equipment. She relishes new experiences and trying different activities, but aspects of everyday life are a struggle as she has various life-limiting conditions, spastic quadriplegia and scoliosis.

An occupational therapist pointed out the many benefits hydrotherapy would have for Lilee-Anne. Being immersed in water allows her to move more easily and with less stiffness. It also enables her to do her physiotherapy exercises with the effects of gravity removed, plus it soothes the joint pain caused by her spastic quadriplegia.

Her family installed a hot tub at home but her manual hoist didn't fit, so they approached Variety for help. The good news was a grant was approved, and a new hoist was purchased - and this has made a huge difference to the whole family.



In 2021, we provided 40 wheelchairs and accessories



Having the right wheelchair can make all the difference when it comes to being more independent, improving medical outcomes and boosting confidence.

We fund wheelchairs for any purpose, provided they are not available through local authority wheelchair services.

In 2021, Variety provided **grants** for:

16 manual wheelchairs

14 powered wheelchairs

8 sports wheelchairs

2 wheelchair accessories



...and we took 10,533 children on a Great Day Out



For disadvantaged children, a day out can become a cherished memory. Variety runs its Great Days Out programme, and each year we take thousands of children to all sorts of venues.

In 2021, Variety partnered with 84 schools, youth and community organisations to take 10,533 children on a Variety Great Day Out.

5,610 children visited zoos, safari parks, wetland centres and farms

2,369 children attended Variety Christmas parties

185 children went to beach parties

20 children went to theatre shows

25 children went fishing

2,324 children went on other Variety Great Days Out, including Zoom parties



Giving Bournemouth young carers a break




Variety funded an outing for a group of young carers and pupils from Bethany Junior School, Bournemouth, to the New Forest Wildlife Park, near Southampton.

Among the highlights of the day were encounters with a snowy owl, a pair of wallabies, a sleepy fox, some pacing wolves and a gang of playful otters.

The trip gave the children a much-needed break from caring, as well as the chance to have fun, reconnect with the natural world and create some fantastic memories.

Some of the children have only been at Bethany for a few weeks. To be able to take them out of school on a trip, after all they have been through over the last 18 months, felt amazing. They finished off their day in the play park zipping down the zip wire and climbing wonderful rope structures, simply having the freedom to run and play, to be children and have fun. They loved this.

Variety Sunshine Coaches make it possible for children with additional needs, or who are growing up in economically deprived areas, to learn practical skills, get access to sport and play facilities and enjoy trips out with their friends.

Enabling learning beyond the classroom at Maes Ebbw

The Maes Ebbw School in Newport has a brand new Variety Sunshine Coach, funded by Variety and St. James's Place Charitable Foundation.

Trips in the Sunshine Coach will enable the school's pupils to benefit from group activities that they otherwise would not be able to do, and in the process equip them with skills that will be beneficial throughout their lives.

The school has already planned for groups of pupils to visit Able Radio – a local radio station – to take part in and produce radio shows.

The new minibus will allow the pupils so many opportunities to take part in activities in the community. Having a specialist minibus for the pupils to travel in safety and comfort allows us to take learning beyond the school.
